
Laxey Methodist Church

This small instrument was built, originally, by J J Faulkner, and renovated by Moses Morgan in 1906. Morgan seems to have added the pedal stop and the Gamba stop (which is so bright as to make up for any lack of a 2' stop in full organ.) Internally, the pipework is a mixture

of old and very old, but sounds well in this small room, with a good range of tonal effects.

The mechanism is mechanical throughout simple and reliable. The mahogany key cheeks are unusually elegant, and the keys themselves have rounded ends to the sharps, after the manner of Forster and Andrews organs of this date.

The light timber of the case belies the instrument's age, as it is merely a thin

cladding, fixed to the original Victorian case when the organ was moved into this building, following the amalgamation of the two Methodist Churches in the village.
